**hang / hanged / hanged** [hæŋ / hæŋd / hæŋd] – a person  
**hang / hung / hung** [hæŋ / hʌŋ / hʌŋ] – wet towels and things

**During a stay in a hotel what do they usually ask people to do with the towels?**

*During a stay in a hotel they usually ask people to put dirty towels on the floor and hang clean towels on a hook.*

**What can we hang on a hanger and on a hook?**

*We can hang clothes on a hanger and towels on a hook.*

**What did they do with murderers in the old times?**

*In the old times they usually hanged murderers in public.*

**Do you agree that murderers should be hanged?**

*Yes, I agree that murderers should be hanged.*

 hang up [hæŋ ʌp]

**ring a bell** [rɪŋ ə bel] If something rings a bell, it seems to you that you have heard it before.

**If someone rings you up but you don't want to have a conversation, what do you do?**

*If someone rings me up but I don't want to have a conversation, I hang up.*

**What can you ask people to do if you want them to wait for you?**

*I can ask people to hang on if I want them to wait for me.*

**What do we say when we think we remember someone's name but not very well?**

*We say that the person's name rings a bell, if we remember it but not very well.*
