Phrasal Verbs

A **phrasal verb** is a combination of words (a verb + a preposition or verb +adverb) that when used together, usually take on a different meaning to that of the original verb.

Vocabulary:

look down on = To consider as inferior

Example: She's such a snob. She always looks down on anyone who is poor.

look up to = To admire

Example: I always looked up to my father. He was a great man.

get on with (something) = To continue to do; make progress

Example: After they split up, she had a hard time getting on with her life.

get over =To recover from (illness, disappointment)

Example: Has she gotten over the flu?

hand in = To submit (report, homework)

Example: Please hand in your papers before Friday.

hand out = To distribute

Example: Susan volunteered at the shelter where she handed out warm clothes.

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run into= To meet by accident or unexpectedly (also: bump into) **Example:** I'm so glad I ran into you. I need to ask you something.
