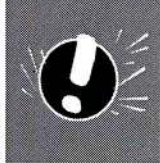

IDIOM	look forward to	[lʊk 'fɔːwəd tə]



We use **look forward to** when we know that something will happen in the future and we are happy about it. **Look forward to** is followed with a *noun* or a *gerund*. For example:
I am looking forward to his letter. Do you look forward to meeting him?

What are your long-term goals?	My long-term goals are <i>finishing this course</i> and <i>getting a better job</i> .
Do people usually look forward to achieving their goals?	Yes, people usually look forward to achieving their goals .
What do children look forward to most during Christmas?	Children look forward to <i>opening presents</i> most during Christmas.
Are people who have gone to work abroad usually looking forward to coming back?	Yes, people who have gone to work abroad are usually looking forward to coming back. <i>or: No, people who have gone to work ...</i>
What do people usually look forward to the most on <i>Friday afternoon</i> ?	People usually look forward to <i>the weekend</i> the most on <i>Friday afternoon</i> .
Would you be pleased to see your favourite football team score a goal?	Yes, I'd be pleased to see my favourite football team score a goal .
What was the score in <i>the match between France and Brazil at the Football Championship in 1998</i> ?	The score in <i>the match between France and Brazil at the Football Championship in 1998</i> was 3:0 for France.

	take pride in sth	[teɪk praɪd ɪn]
	proud	[praʊd]

Are you proud when you achieve your goals? Yes, I'm **proud** when I achieve my goals.

Do you take pride in your work? Yes, I **take pride in** my work.
