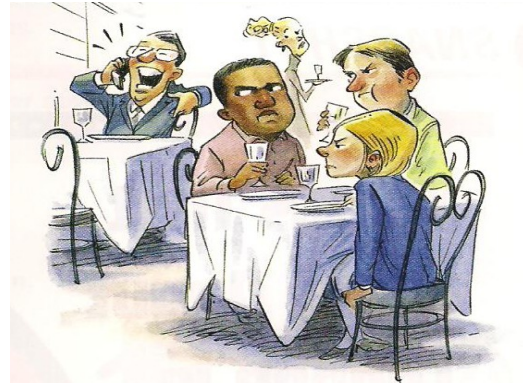

Cell Phone Etiquette
