Adverbs: Using still, yet, and already

Still

We use still to show that something continues up to a time in the past present or future.

• It goes in front of the main verb:

The children still enjoyed playing games.

They are still living next door.

We will still be on holiday.

• Or *after* the present simple or the past simple of *be*:

Her grandfather is still alive.

They were still unhappy.

4 Already

We use **already** to show that something has happened sooner that it was expected to happen.

• Like still, it comes before the main verb:

The car is okay. I've already fixed it.

It was early but they were already sleeping.

• Or after the present simple or past simple of the verb be:

It was early but we were already tired.

We are already late.
