

Genitive Case

Genitive case

Genitive case is the grammatical case that marks a noun as modifying another noun. It often marks a noun as being the possessor of another noun; however, it can also indicate various other relationships than possession.

Examples:

- Janet's long fingers, Janet's jacket, Janet's drink (relationship indicating possession)
- a wheel of cheese (a relationship indicating composition)
- the love of music (participation in an action)
- men of Rome (origin)
- the capital of the Republic (reference)
- man of honor (description)
